Since the 1980s many educational systems in many countries have been transformed through decentralization and deregulation of decision making and organization of schooling. The Swedish educational system was in the late 1980s one of the most centralized school systems in the world, but after a series of changes it had by the mid 1990s been transformed into one of the most decentralized systems. Against this background there is reason to take advantage of international and national research on consequences of this development in schooling. We have invited leading researchers from different disciplines to present and discuss their findings.
